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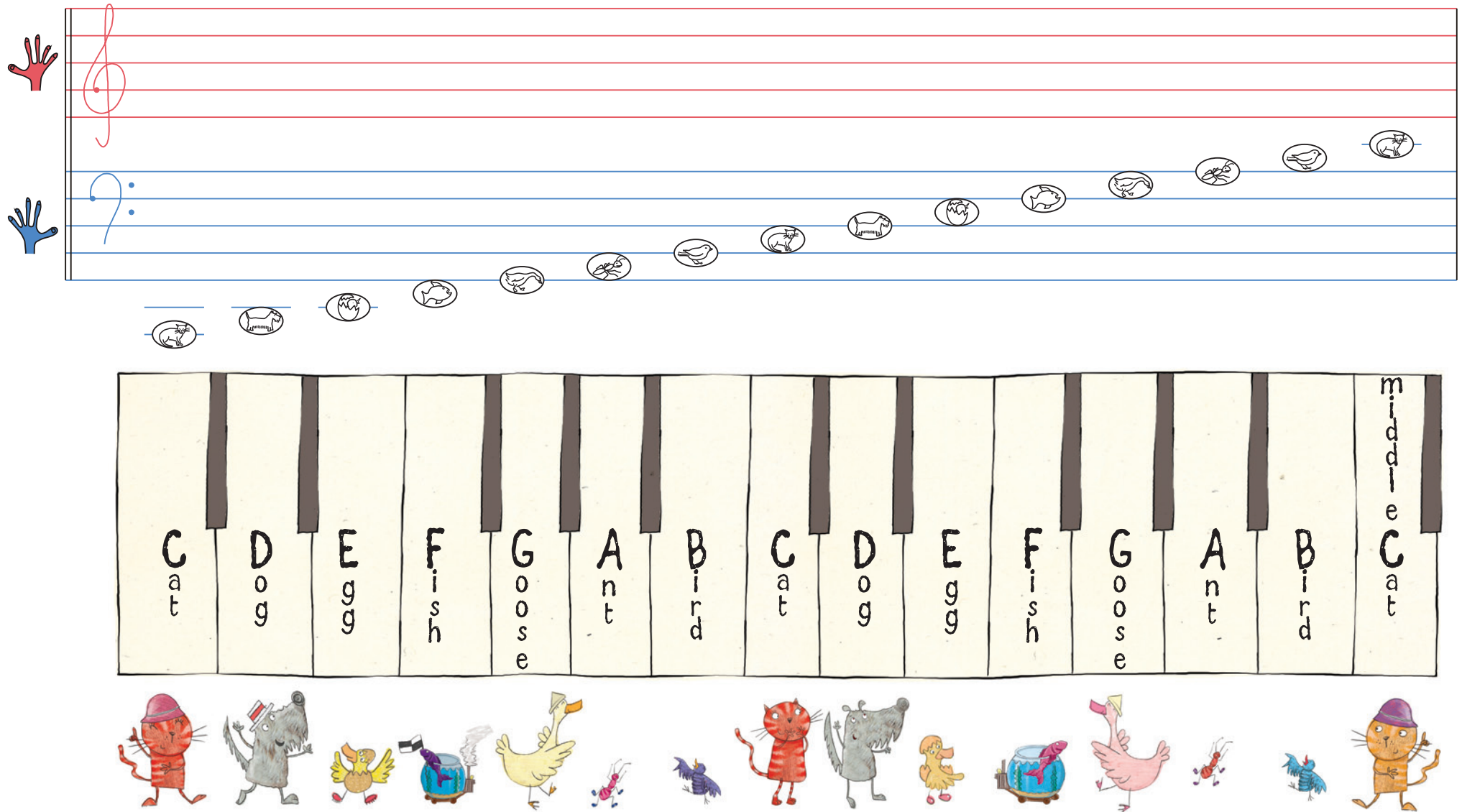
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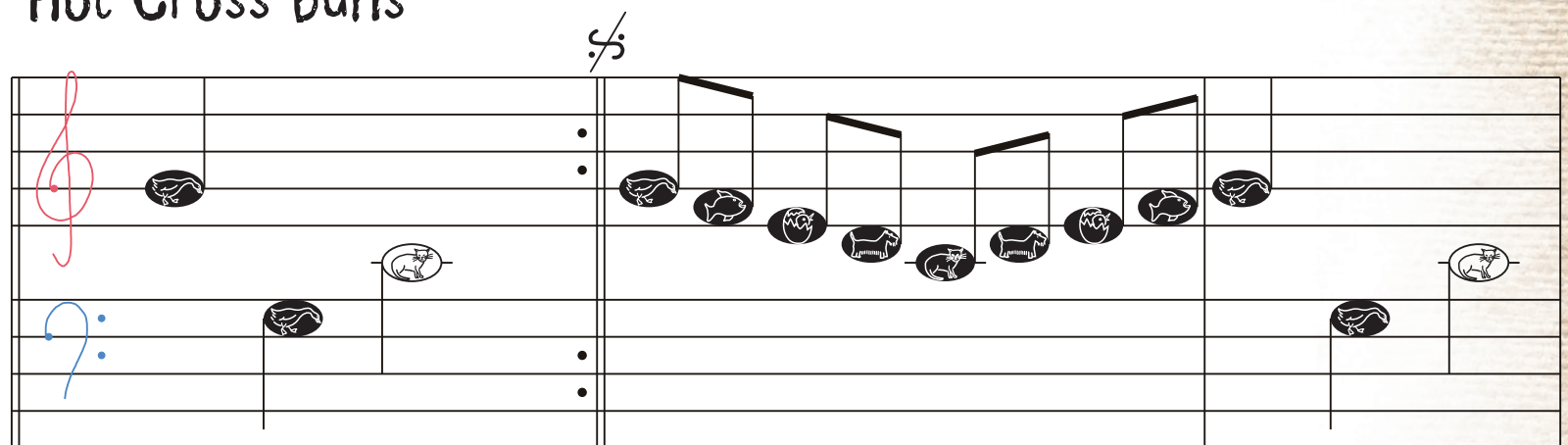

The Staves and Keyboard

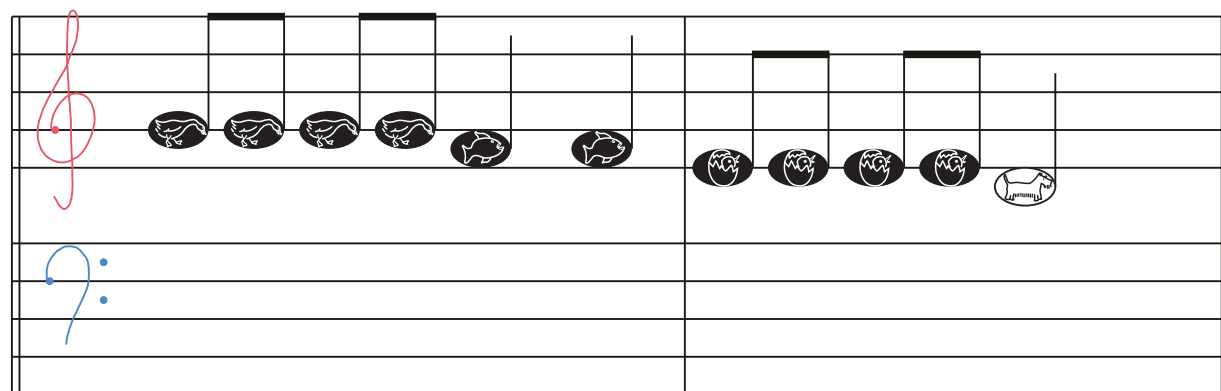


- It is extremely beneficial for the child to sing the animal names whilst playing. The parent or teacher can encourage this by singing along with the child.
- It is important to use the weight of the whole arm when playing (especially for very young children, who should play each note separated).
- Use the left (blue) hand to play middle-C and below, and the right (red) hand to play middle-C and above. Mark the child's hands with coloured marker pens or stickers, or put coloured rubber bands or ribbons on his/her wrists to help to identify the hands.

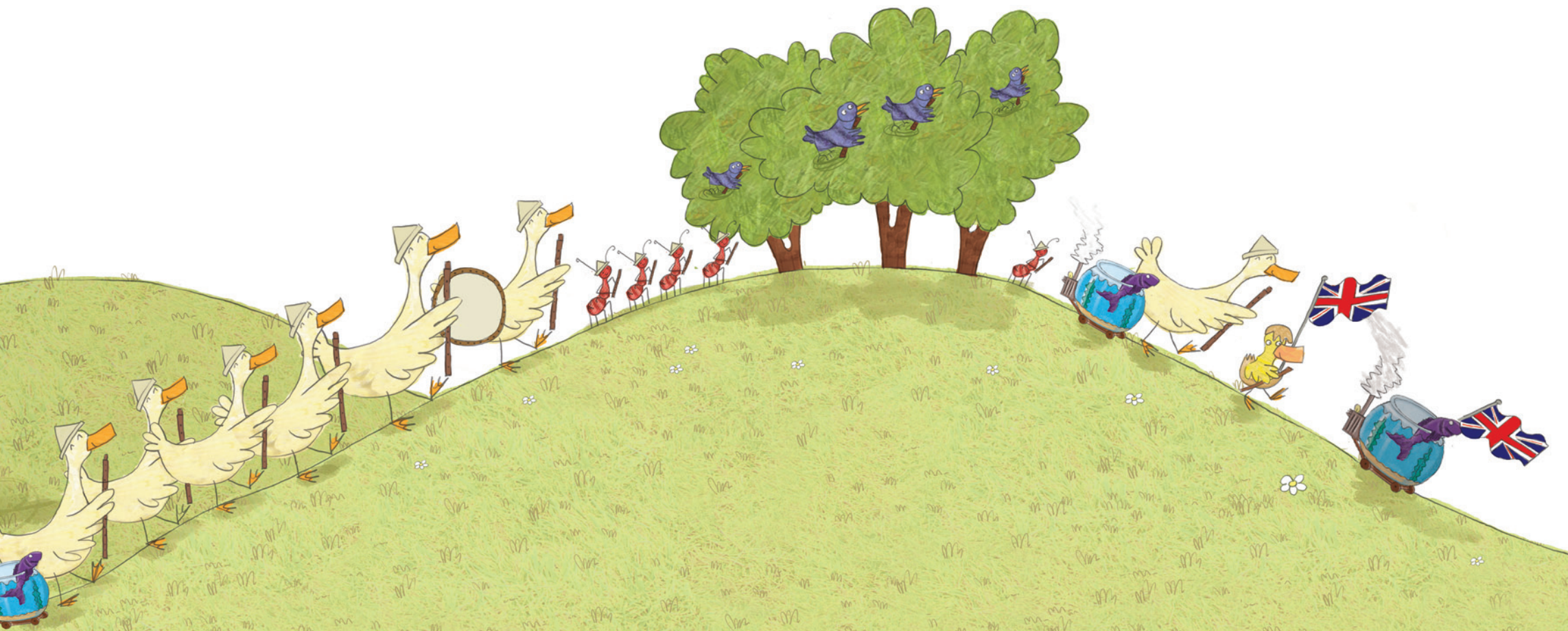



































The Grand Old Duke of York

He marched them up to the top of the hill, And he marched them down again.

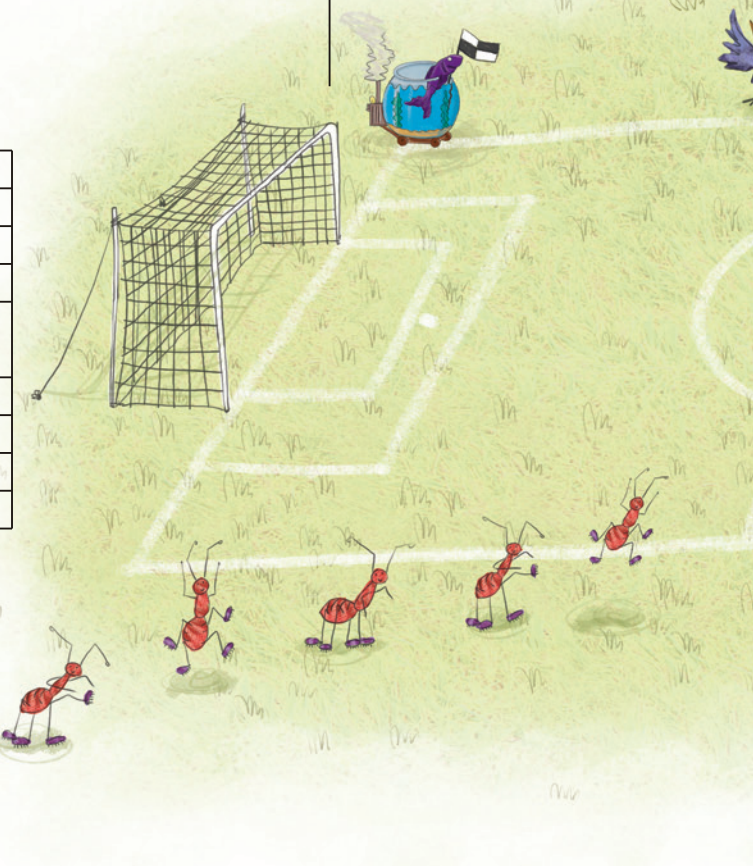
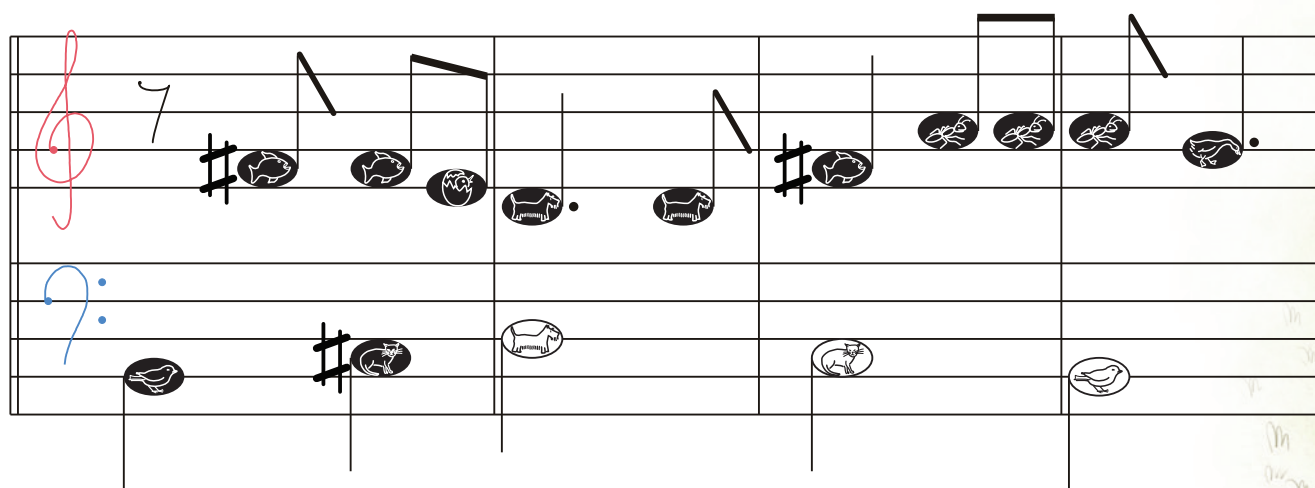
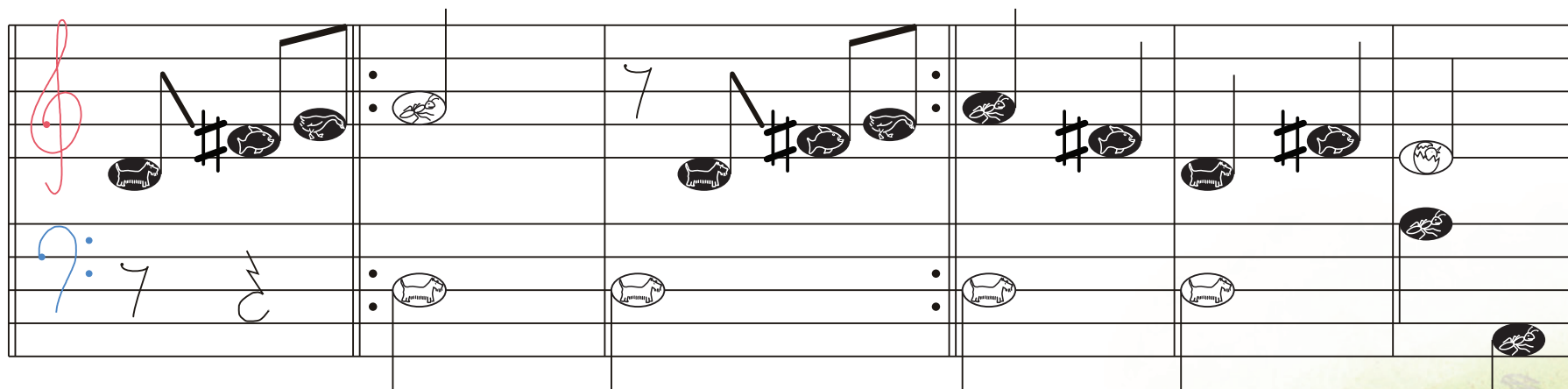


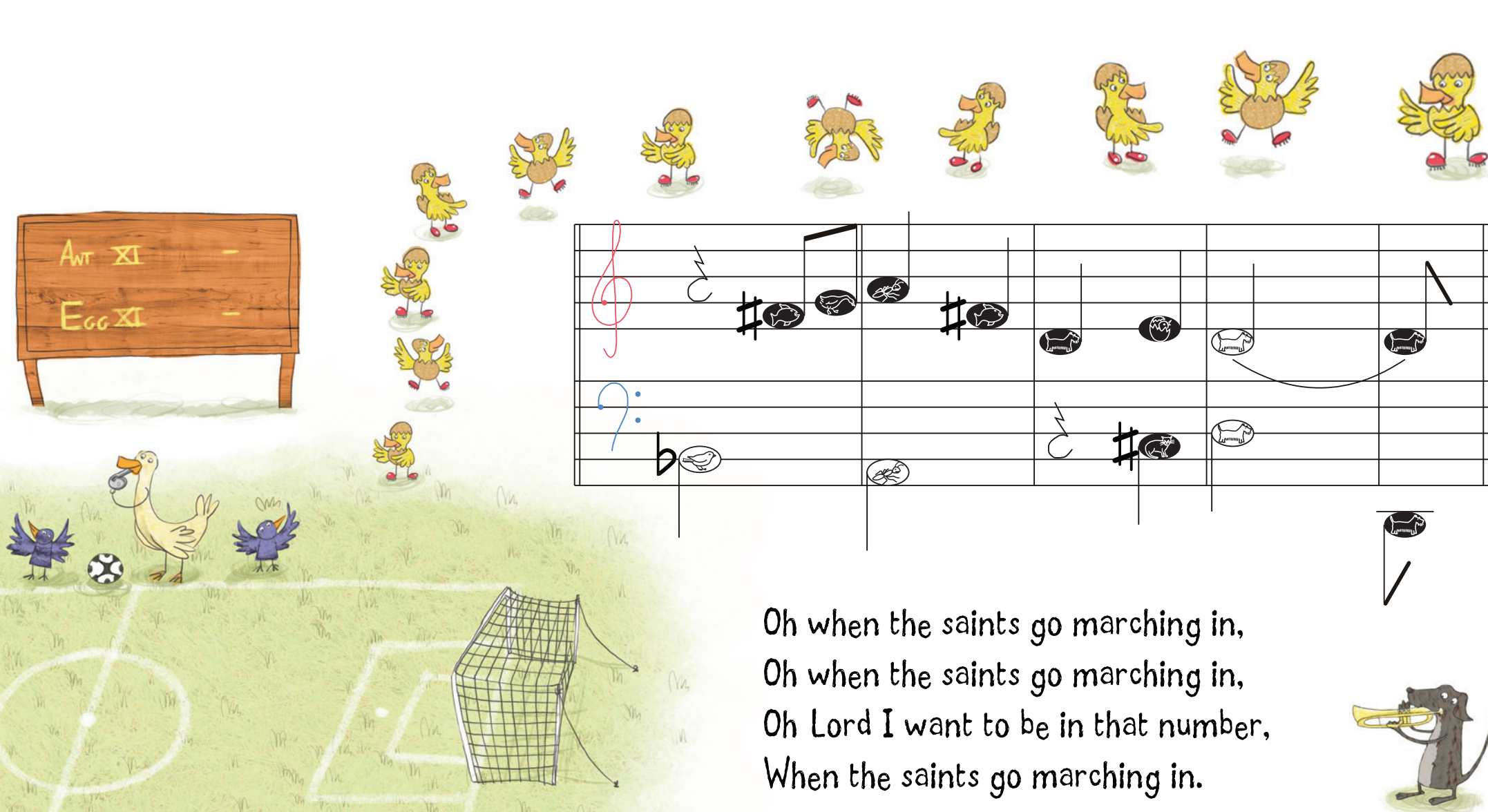
